The manual on analytical reading and mastering communication skills in English is intended for higher education students specializing in 035 Philology ("English-Ukrainian Translation and Translation from the Second Foreign Language"). Among the key objectives of this book are: developing skills in analytical reading of authentic English publicistic texts; oral and written translation on current socio-political topics; broadening the general and lexical knowledge of undergraduate students; and enhancing speaking skills in English through in-depth discussions of studied topics.

The manual addresses a gap in instructional materials for the secondyear students (third and fourth semesters) of the educational and professional program "English-Ukrainian Translation and Translation from the Second Foreign Language" within the compulsory component "First Foreign Language" particularly in the "Oral Communication" aspect, studied by Translation students. The materials can also be used to improve analytical reading and oral communication skills in English for students of other humanitarian disciplines with an upper-intermediate language proficiency level. The texts and exercises given in the manual aim to improve general English language proficiency, reading of original texts, translation skills, and the expansion of vocabulary on contemporary topics addressing various social, political, psychological, and cultural issues.

The structure of the coursebook comprises eight units, supplements, and references. The sixteen texts included in the manual cover and complement topics aligned with the syllabus of "First Foreign Language" course for the second-year students of the educational and professional program "English-Ukrainian Translation and Translation from the Second Foreign Language."

Each unit is based on contemporary original articles, sourced from popular British and American online media. All original texts for student work are provided in supplements. The units offer comprehensive information on the respective topics and include a list of essential words and expressions recommended for learning. The texts and assignments





focus on reading and understanding authentic publicistic texts, extracting necessary information, expanding topic-specific vocabulary, improving oral and written translation skills, and developing English oral communication skills.

At the beginning of each unit, students are provided with an exercise of reading the original text and identifying key words to guide them in further studying. The next step involves performing various exercises based on the article. The comprehension exercise set includes, in particular, questions requiring specific answers based on the article; trueor-false tasks based on the text; sentence completion exercises using phrases from the text; and gap-fill tasks based on the information from the article.

The next set of exercises focuses on internalizing relevant vocabulary and translating it from English into Ukrainian and vice versa. For each original text, a block of exercises is provided for translating words and phrases from the article into Ukrainian and English. Based on these phrases, students are given sentence translation tasks in both languages, which can also be performed during practical classes in the format of oral consecutive interpretation.

The final block of exercises is designed to develop speaking skills, encourage discussions of the studied topics, and motivate students to engage in active dialogues and exchange experiences. These tasks include describing a picture related to the unit's topic, completing questionnaires and discussing the results in groups, engaging in group or pair discussions on the studied topic and broader or related issues, and preparing short creative tasks and projects.

Overall, the manual encourages students to work analytically with authentic texts, develop oral communication skills, participate in dialogues and critical discussions, engage in English-Ukrainian translation, and acquire essential linguistic knowledge for discussing contemporary topics.

The authors express their sincere gratitude to the reviewers for their critical reading of the manual, constructive comments, and suggestions, professional advice, and intellectual support.

The authors remain open to and grateful for further feedback, suggestions, and recommendations for improving and refining the content of this coursebook.

WHY SOME GRANDPARENTS DISAGREE WITH THEIR KIDS' PARENTING STYLES – AND WHAT THEY SHOULD DO ABOUT IT

As a grandparent, one of the hardest things to do is sit quietly on the sidelines while watching your adult children make what you consider parenting mistakes with the grandkids. The temptation to offer advice is overwhelming, but there's a time and a place to communicate your concerns without shaming your kids. Unfortunately, too many grandparents are eager to jump in with unsolicited advice, which can strain the family relations.

I was raised in the 1960s by parents who resorted to corporal punishment, as did many families from that era. When my husband and I had children in the '80s, we used the "time-out" method to discipline our kids, and it worked just fine. Luckily, my parents respected our rules whenever they babysat the kids and never raised a hand to them. They also never offered parental advice unless we asked for their opinion. This show of respect proved their confidence in us as parents.

When grandparents and parents disagree

However, if a grandchild is often unruly and disrespectful and has parents who turn a blind eye to the bad behavior, should a grandparent speak up? Katherine, a grandmother of two in Tennessee, tried to discuss her grandson's aggressive behavior with her daughter but was immediately shut down. "My daughter lets my 8-year-old grandson do whatever he wants," she tells me. "There are no rules — [he] backtalks and even hits his mom. She yells at him, but he never listens, and then kisses him on the forehead. Or she'll take him to the store afterward to buy him something. We've tried talking to





her about his bad behavior, but she gets defensive and says, 'Don't tell me what to do with my kid.' So we gave up, and now my grandson is just as spoiled as ever."

Many grandparents blame the breakdown of so-called proper parenting on a generation of new parents who, they feel, overindulge the kids.

"Some of these kids act entitled, lacking values and respect, " says Paul, a grandfather of four from Kansas. "But my friends are too afraid to confront their adult kids about this because they may be barred from seeing the grandchildren if the parents are offended. It's sad, really."

In Paul's view, "these parents give in to their children's tantrums because they're too busy or too distracted to discipline them." He adds, "They're too soft on discipline, letting their kids get away with bratty behavior — and without consequences — and it shows. Our generation was punished for our actions, which taught us not to make the same mistake again. Those consequences strengthened our moral compasses and gave us a tougher skin."

As Katherine's experience shows, pointing out these perceived parenting flaws (even when it comes from a place of love) often backfires, creating distance between the parents and grandparents. As difficult as it may seem, it's best for the child and the family if the parents are allowed to do the parenting themselves without interference from the grandparents, unless the child's safety is at risk.

What an expert says

According to Margaret Rutherford, a clinical psychologist and host of the podcast SelfWork, some of these parenting conflicts can be generational. "So much of what today's parents are exposed to — what the medical profession is saying about caring for children, what the current parenting trends are and what their friends are doing — influences their parenting," she says. "This is constantly changing, and parenting styles will change along with it. And what works for one child may not work for another."

Grandparents need to consider these factors before deciding whether to approach their adult children about a grandchild's behavioral issues. Rutherford suggests establishing a healthy, respectful relationship with the adult child and their partner or co-parent from the beginning.

"Once grandkids come along, the family bond has already been formed," she explains. "Ask your biological adult child first about what they notice are the differences between the way you raised them and the way they are parenting their own children. If you have a good working relationship with them, hopefully this will be a conversation, not an argument."





Cutting new parents some slack

But every generation of parents faces new challenges from the one before it. I'm sympathetic to today's parents because they're raising kids in a very different world — one in which screen time and social media are powerful influences. And let's not forget the impact of the pandemic, in which countless parents were tasked with juggling remote work and child care. Many are still dealing with the effects on their children's mental health, socialization, learning and more. It's hard to blame anyone for leaning on screen time or buying a new toy to entertain a child stuck at home.

"Sure, children today have been spoiled with an excessive amount of toys, but I blame it on COVID," says my friend Ronna, a grandmother of eight. "When parents returned to work, they felt bad for their kids and compensated by buying more things to ease the adjustment. So yes, this generation of grandkids may be spoiled when it comes to having lots of toys, but I think their parents are doing a wonderful job under these unusual circumstances."

Every generation believes they're raising their children better than the previous one. We've gone from authoritarian parenting to helicopter parenting to the current preoccupation with gentle parenting. Grandparents my age who were raised with strict rules may struggle to to stay quiet when they spot a grandchild misbehaving, and they may resent the recent changes in parenting styles.

"I'm sure grandparents find this difficult to watch if they think a swat on the butt might settle things," says Rutherford, "but their best bet is to have that trusting, family relationship in place first before the grandkids come along. Then their suggestions may flow a little more calmly. However, things will not go well for the grandparents if the advice comes from a place of control or disdain."

Most importantly, grandparents should never criticize the parents in front of the grandchildren, as this undermines their adult child's authority. Remember, they're the ones in charge, and the boundaries they've set should not be ignored (again, unless there is any endangerment to the child).

The good news is that millennials are introducing a new era of open communication that emphasizes raising emotionally intelligent children. They're paying closer attention to mental health issues and providing more encouragement by focusing on the positives. As grandparents, we should take a lesson from their parenting playbook and allow them to make their own choices without our interference.





IS A \$600 PRIVATE CABANA AT UNIVERSAL'S VOLCANO BAY WATER PARK WORTH IT? MY PARTY OF 10 TESTED IT OUT FOR A DAY TO FIND OUT.

All pricing aside, the luxury and convenience of having the cabanas for the day made our experience even more fun than a normal day at Volcano Bay.

I spend a lot of time at the theme parks throughout Central Florida. I've sweated it out in 100-degree temperatures to ride popular roller coasters and battled crowds to see the return of beloved parades and shows after the coronavirus pandemic caused them to be canceled. The theme park life is fun, but stressful at times. But there's a place where my family has never experienced a stressful day – Volcano Bay, the South Seasthemed water park located at Universal Orlando Resort.

At Volcano Bay, guests are immersed in a world designed to feel like its at the base of a volcano on an island in the Pacific. Like any water park, there are water slides and wave pools. But there are also tropical drinks, an aqua roller coaster and some of the most beautiful greenery I've ever seen in a park.

When guests enter Volcano Bay, there's always a mad rush to claim beach chairs, which are set up on the park's main sandy beach area and in other areas throughout the destination. There's even an option to reserve premium seating — two chairs with an attached sun shade – for an additional fee. Although both are great options we've tried before, I've always been curious about the secret life of the people who hang out in rented cabanas for the day.

So my family and six friends hit Volcano Bay for the day to see what the cabana life is really like. The experience did not disappoint, and just may be the only way I do Volcano Bay from here on out, budget permitting, of course.

How much is a Volcano Bay cabana, how do you rent one and what comes with it?

There are 51 cabanas at Volcano Bay, 10 of which are "tower units," meaning there are two cabanas stacked on top of each other. Standard cabanas hold up to six people, while the two family suites on the property can house up to 16 guests for the day.





Like so many aspects of theme parks, prices for a daily cabana rental vary depending on things like the time of year you visit and how close to the date you book. Universal Orlando keeps quiet on the pricing for these rentals, but Orlando Informer reports single-level cabanas start around \$160 for the day and can go up to \$450, while top-level cabanas (which have incredible views of the park and volcano) run from \$200 to \$550 or higher. (On the day we visited, our top-level cabanas were priced at around \$600 for the day).

Cabanas can't be booked online, so interested guests must call Universal Orlando Resort to inquire about rentals.

What comes with the daily rental fee? Guests receive a private, shaded area to call their own that has comfortable cushioned seating, a mini fridge, lounge chairs, complimentary water bottles, fresh fruit and snacks, towel and locker service and their own concierge, who can deliver food and drinks from an exclusive menu specific to cabana guests. Inside the cabana, there's also a TapuTapu screen, the interface guests use to reserve a spot in line for busy attractions. (Using a wristband, simply tap the screen and choose the ride you'd like to wait in a virtual line for. The device will let you know when it's time to return.)

Is a cabana at Volcano Bay worth the cost?

On the morning of our cabana rental at Volcano Bay, we entered the park and checked in at the concierge desk, where we were introduced to a guide who escorted our group to our assigned cabanas. Since we were a party of 10, we were assigned to two side-by-side cabanas on the second level of a group of cabanas overlooking the wave pool and volcano.

We were greeted by a beautiful arrangement of fresh fruit and breakfast muffins – plenty of food to hold our party over until later in the day when lunch would be served. We snacked and drank bottled water while applying sunscreen, then used our TapuTapu interface to get ourselves in a virtual line for the Krakatau Aqua Coaster, our favorite ride in the park. We met our concierge, who would be helping us with everything from cocktail orders to fresh towels throughout the day, and spent some time relaxing and taking in the gorgeous view.

Throughout the morning, we went our separate ways, the kids hitting as many water slides and pools as possible while the moms and dads alternated between floating in the lazy river and relaxing in the lounge chairs in our cabana.





When the bars in the park opened, our concierge appeared to take our drink orders. The only thing that made our cabana more perfect was sipping a tropical beverage while looking out at the volcano – we were truly in vacation mode.

At lunch, we ordered everything from cheeseburgers for the kids to coconut shrimp for the adults. (Beyond complimentary water and a basket of fruit and pastries, all other food and drinks cost extra.) We spent the afternoon hitting more pools and water slides, but loved having the central and easy-to-find meeting place of the cabana since we had six teenagers with us. They loved not having to stick close to their parents, and we loved knowing they had a safe spot to keep returning to in the cabana.

An appetizer platter, with delights like coconut shrimp and conch fritters, is available on the cabana guest menu.

When a kid got tired, they rested on the comfortable cushioned chairs of the cabana and checked their phone. When the dads got tired, they took a little nap in the lounge chairs in the sunshine. It was an idyllic day that felt different than any other day I'd spent at Volcano Bay. It was Volcano Bay ... elevated.

While I certainly couldn't afford to drop \$600 on cabana rentals every time my family visits Volcano Bay, my friends and I agreed it would be an amazing once-a-summer splurge to do together. In the seasons when cabanas are a bit more affordable, it'd also be easier to budget for.

All pricing aside, the luxury and convenience of having the cabanas for the day made our experience even more fun than a normal day at Volcano Bay. Like anything involved with a theme park vacation, it's all about what activities are a priority to your family and which don't seem worth it for *you*. If relaxation, avoiding the crowds on the main beach and being waited on hand and foot are a priority for your family when you visit a water park, cabana rentals at Volcano Bay may be worth it for you.



'WHEN I FIGHT, I CAN FEEL MY SOUL ALIVE,' SAYS HATTAN ALSAIF, SAUDI ARABIA'S GROUNDBREAKING MMA STAR

CNN – Hattan Alsaif has grown accustomed to sparring with men. Rarely shy about confronting heavier, stronger opponents, she knows what it's like to absorb blow after blow until tears begin to shine in her eyes, her face red and hot from crying.

As one of the few women at her gym in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia – and the only woman hopeful of fighting at an elite level – Alsaif had little choice but to train with and against her male counterparts when she first took up martial arts. She credits her sometimes brutal introduction to the sport as one of the reasons for her success.

"I was the only girl doing it day and night, day and night, day and night," Alsaif told CNN Sport. "I always spar with guys, I train with guys, I'm always with the guys in the gym.

"It's not an easy thing, so when it comes to the cage, when I get a hit from a girl, I feel like, 'Whoa, is this all you've got?"

The 22-year-old had already made history in MMA, even before her atomweight bout against Egypt's Nada Faheem on Friday, which she won by knock out in the second round.

In January, Alsaif signed a contract with the Professional Fighters League (PFL), making her the first woman from Saudi Arabia to join a global MMA promotion.

It was a notable moment in a country known for its socially conservative attitudes, where sporting opportunities have historically been limited for women. The Saudi women's soccer team only played its first match two years ago, while a domestic soccer league wasn't established until 2020.

Alsaif is acutely aware of her status as a trailblazer for female MMA fighters in Saudi Arabia and takes such a responsibility seriously.

"It's big, to be honest, because I'm going to be carrying this thing my entire life," she said, speaking to CNN before her MMA debut fight on Friday. "It's a bit heavy to carry it, but I'm excited and proud to be the person to do it."

Alsaif endured a difficult upbringing, orphaned at the age of 10 after both of her parents died in a short space of time. She says she battled



depression during her teenage years before finding solace in martial arts, helping her to discover a sense of purpose and peace.

"I didn't have a normal childhood or an easy childhood because of the loss of my parents," said Alsaif. "But after God, martial arts helped me a lot - so, so, so much. It changed my life 100% for the better.

"That's why I'm so addicted to martial arts. I don't want to stop doing [it] because it's just the thing that makes me feel alive. I feel I'm alive when I train, when I fight, in the gym – I can feel my soul alive.

"When I breathe after the rounds, when I feel sick, when I feel tired, when I feel courage, when I feel scared, those moments, every part of that, it makes me feel alive. It's something that means a lot to me."

Growing up, Alsaif had always loved extreme, adrenaline-fueled sports, and her curiosity to try something new took her to a boxing gym in her local neighborhood.

That piqued her interest, but she soon found that the boxing class she was attending lacked rigor and professionalism. Then, after seeing videos of Saudi MMA fighter Abdullah Al-Qahtani on social media, the pair exchanged messages and Alsaif was invited to try the sport for herself.

"I started looking at the guys, and they were hitting the bags with kicks and elbows and knees," she recalled. "I was like, they have more weapons than I do. I only have hands [in boxing]. I felt so jealous ... I love to do the things that have more power."

Alsaif started to compete in Muay Thai – the stand-up, striking combat sport originating in Thailand – and went on to win titles at the World Combat Games, the Saudi Games and the International Federation of Muaythai Associations (IFMA) World Championships under the guidance of coach Feras Sadaa.

Sadaa, coach of Saudi Arabia's Muay Thai national team, has been central to Alsaif's success, though his influence extends far beyond a sporting sphere.

"All these years, I never felt what [having a] father means at all," said Alsaif. "And he was a gift from God. He did everything with me. He helped me in every situation, in the gym or outside of the gym.

"He was like family. He always told anyone else that Hattan is not just my student, Hattan is one of my kids ... I wish to make him so happy [and] represent him in the best way I can."





Friday's fight card in Riyadh, headlined by Al-Qahtani, was Alsaif's first chance to assess whether she was able to translate her Muay Thai prowess into success in an MMA cage.

The event, part of the PFL's growing prominence in the region, featured fighters from across the Middle East and North Africa, less than three months since Claressa Shields and Kelsey De Santis contested the first professional female MMA bout in Saudi Arabia.

Last year, SURJ Sports Investments Company, which is owned by Saudi Arabia's Public Investment Fund (PIF), acquired a minority stake in the PFL, part of the PFL's strategy to recruit more fighters and attract more fans in the MENA region.

Alsaif never envisioned herself becoming an MMA pioneer when she took her first curious steps into a combat gym, but said that she wants to leave a legacy in the sport.

Her upcoming bout is the first step towards achieving that goal and also an opportunity to reflect on all that she has overcome during her short time as an MMA fighter.

She does that between rounds in the gym, wiping any tears from her eyes and reminding herself of the effort and energy she has so far devoted to her pursuit.

"I start looking at myself in the mirror and I'd be like, 'You have killed yourself; you have cried; you have sacrificed everything," said Alsaif. "You are really strong; you are your own role model' ... It does give me a lot of motivation."





HOUSING TROUBLES SQUEEZE SPENDING

After a strong start to the year, spending has slumped as a real estate downturn weighs on consumers. Communist Party leaders are meeting this week to discuss what to do about it.

Economic growth slumped in China through the spring after a strong start this year, according to data released on Monday, as a real estate crash caused consumers to spend more cautiously.

The latest growth statistics for the world's second-largest economy, covering April through June, put further pressure on the Communist Party as its leaders gathered on Monday in Beijing for a four-day conclave to set a course for the country's economic future.

In a country known for strict controls on information, the Chinese government is maintaining a particularly tight grip ahead of the party gathering, known as the Third Plenum, which typically takes place every five years. China's National Bureau of Statistics canceled its usual news conference that accompanies the release of data and Chinese companies are mostly avoiding the release of earnings reports this week.

China's economy grew 0.7 percent in the second quarter over the previous three months, below the expectations of most economists. When projected out for the entire year, the economy grew at an annual rate of about 2.8 percent – a little less than half the rate in the first three months of this year.

The statistical bureau also revised down its estimate of growth in the first quarter. That rate, projected out for the full year, was about 6.1 percent, not the 6.6 percent rate disclosed in April.

Xi Jinping, China's top leader, is trying to win confidence in his policies as growth falters and the property market suffers.

China has tried to offset the real estate downturn by building more factories – new investments in manufacturing surged 9.5 percent in the first half of this year – and stepping up exports.

Rapid expansion of manufacturing has led to a glut of goods, from chemicals to cars, and a lot of unused industrial capacity. Companies have sharply reduced prices to compete for consumers, who nonetheless remain reluctant to spend, long a problem for the investment-led economy.





At the same time, China's record-setting export surge is provoking a global backlash of higher tariffs, as countries fear the flood of Chinese goods will overwhelm local industries. Yet in China, the extra export revenue has not been enough to fully offset weak consumer spending at home.

The statistical bureau summarized the state of the economy with a cautious statement. Progress had been made in upgrading Chinese industries, the bureau said, while acknowledging that "the domestic effective demand remains insufficient."

Shares of large mainland Chinese companies dropped in Hong Kong trading after the data release.

The slowdown in growth was less apparent in the Chinese government's preferred statistic: how much larger the economy was in the second quarter versus the same period last year. This measure showed the economy had grown 4.7 percent, down from 5.3 percent year-over-year growth in the previous quarter.

China's government has set a target for growth this year of "around 5 percent."

The government is trying to revitalize consumer spending. Retail sales grew just 2 percent in June from a year earlier, propped up only by strong sales of food. Car sales slumped 6.2 percent in June from a year earlier, partly because automakers have cut prices to attract buyers.

Analysts at Société Générale, a French bank, called the slump in retail sales "just shocking," and described China's economy as "limping along precariously."

Economists inside and outside of China have contended that Beijing should sharply increase state pensions, government-provided health insurance and welfare payments. Such measures could be funded by trimming China's extensive military buildup or by transferring dividends and shares from state-owned enterprises to the national pension fund. The government has been reluctant to redirect large sums of money from agencies or state-owned firms.

Few expect drastic moves at this week's Communist Party conclave. The country continues to pursue an investment-led strategy that focuses on erecting more buildings instead of putting money into consumers' pockets.

That trend was visible on a recent evening in Nanchang, a city in south-central China. The Wanshou Palace neighborhood has been





extensively renovated with stone walkways, free music shows and many shops and restaurants. Throngs of tourists milled in the streets taking photos, but few entered the stores or eateries to spend money.

Many shoppers say that they buy the cheapest products they can find to stretch their budgets. Gong Yilan, a 21-year-old teacher, paid the equivalent of \$3.40 for a pair of blue earrings as a souvenir during a vacation in Jingdezhen, another city in south-central China.

"If I spend too much on costly things, I don't have enough money to support my next trip," she said.

Local governments face financial difficulties mainly because of dwindling sales to developers of leases on state land. Builders are struggling to finish promised housing units and have scant cash to spare.

"Simply put, with 20 million or so unfinished, presold homes behind in their delivery schedules, the housing crisis is not over yet," analysts at Nomura, a Japanese bank, said in a research report.

Until recently, housing construction was one of China's biggest industries, creating millions of jobs. Apartment sales appear to be leveling off after three years of declines, but at a very low level. As in many countries, commercial real estate is starting to run into trouble.

Construction companies in China are trying to weather not just a slowing pace of domestic building but also dwindling orders from overseas. China has put a limit on loans to developing countries over the past several years, as many of these borrowers have struggled to repay previous loans.

Zhongmei Engineering Group, a Chinese construction company in Nanchang, used to build as much as 40 percent of its projects overseas, mainly in Africa. But now these projects are less than 20 percent of its business.

"They are not financially able to hire our company," said Qin Jian, the general manager of Zhongmei's international operations.

Like many Chinese construction companies, Zhongmei has turned to building more infrastructure and factories in China. Beijing has helped local governments borrow money to spend on new sewers, water lines, roads and other infrastructure.

A persistent worry is that China may have so much excess factory capacity that the economy may see a broad decline in prices – a dangerous phenomenon known as deflation. Falling prices give consumers an incentive to put off purchases in hopes of getting a better deal later and





make it harder for borrowers to repay their debts. Overall debt levels in China are higher than in the United States relative to the size of their economies, mainly because of heavy borrowing by state-owned enterprises. Many Chinese are struggling to make mortgage payments on apartments that are falling in value.

Wholesale prices charged by factories, farms and other producers had dropped 0.8 percent in June from a year earlier. Consumer prices are still rising, barely: up just 0.2 percent last month from the year before.

The Chinese economy has had two bright spots in recent weeks, however. A decision to stop requiring visas for tourists from more European countries and Australia and New Zealand has produced an immediate jump in international visitors. Hotels in the heart of Shanghai and Beijing have raised prices sharply. But hotels even a couple miles away still charge rates that have barely increased since the worst days of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Much more important for the Chinese economy has been the powerful boom in exports of manufactured goods. The country's overall trade surplus – the amount by which exports exceed imports – surged last month to a record \$99 billion.



How does the brain think? – Tom, age 16, San Diego, California

Have you ever wondered how your brain creates thoughts or why something randomly popped into your head? It may seem like magic – but actually the brain is like a supercomputer inside your head that helps you think, learn and make decisions.

Imagine your brain as a busy city with lots of streets and buildings. Each part of the brain has a specific job to do, just like certain areas of a city or certain buildings serve different purposes. When you have a thought, it's like a message traveling through the city, passing from one area to another.

As a professor of psychology and neuroscience, I have studied the brain for almost 20 years. Neurologists, neuroscientists and neurosurgeons work every day to understand the brain better. And there's still a lot to learn.

Practice and repetition create skills

The neuron is a key player in the brain – these are tiny cells that send and receive signals and messages so they can communicate with each other.

Your brain has somewhere between 80 billion and 100 billion neurons. Neurons tend to group together to form neural tracts, which would be like the streets and highways in the city analogy. When you have a thought, neurons in your brain fire up and create electrical impulses. These impulses tend to travel along similar pathways and release tiny chemicals called neurotransmitters along the way.

These neurotransmitters are like the construction crew that builds the roads, making it easier for the messages to be delivered. You can imagine it as a dirt road, but as more traffic – that is, neuron signals – travel the dirt road, the road gets upgraded to a paved street. If the traffic continues, it gets upgraded to a highway.

As you learn new things and experience the world around you, these connections grow stronger. For example, when you are learning to ride a bike, you may be unsteady and find it hard to coordinate all of the different





muscles along with your ability to balance. But the more you practice, the more the neurons controlling your muscles and your ability to balance fire together, which makes it much easier as you practice. Neurons are wiring together and forming neural networks.

That's why practice and repetition are important for improving your skills, whether playing the piano or learning a language. Neural networks are created and then strengthened the more times they communicate together. Scientists have a saying in this field: "Neurons that fire together wire together." Certain thinking or behavior patterns can be chalked up to this kind of repeated synchronized activity.

Developing creativity

You are conscious of only a very small portion of the information your brain takes in. It is constantly receiving input from your senses – sights, sounds, tastes, smells and touch. When you see a cute puppy or hear your favorite song, your senses send signals to the brain, triggering a chain reaction of thoughts and emotions.

The brain also stores memories, which are like files in a computer that you can access whenever you need them. Memories help shape your thoughts and influence how you see the world.

If you remember a fun day at the beach, it might make you feel happy and relaxed. If you smell an apple pie, it may remind you of your grandma's baking. These thoughts are triggered because these pleasant associations have been formed in your brain, and through repetition, strengthened over time.

Creativity is another superpower of the brain. When you let your imagination run wild, your brain can come up with new ideas, stories and inventions. Artists, writers and scientists all use their creative brains to explore new possibilities and solve problems.

Have you ever experienced a "eureka" moment when a brilliant idea pops into your head out of nowhere? That's your brain's way of connecting the dots and coming up with a solution.

Keeping your brain healthy

Most scientists agree that sleep is really important for your brain to process information from the day and to allow it to rest and form new connections. A lot of people find that they have new ideas or thoughts after a good night's sleep. The opposite is true, too – without enough sleep, you may feel like you can't think straight.





Along with enough sleep, eat healthy foods and exercise. Just like a car needs fuel to run smoothly, your brain needs nutrients and oxygen to function at its best and to boost your thinking power.

Activities that challenge you are also great: reading, doing puzzles, playing music, making art, doing math, writing essays and book reports and journaling. Positive thinking also helps. Keep in mind that whatever you are consuming – what you're eating or what you're watching, listening to or reading – has the power to influence your brain.

Conversely, smoking cigarettes, vaping, drinking alcohol and using drugs kills brain cells. So might head injuries that can occur when playing sports such as football, soccer and bicycling – but wearing a helmet can make a big difference.

The brain is a fascinating organ that works tirelessly to create thoughts, memories and ideas. As technology continues to improve, scientists will learn more and more about how biological processes give rise to our conscious experiences. The challenges of learning about the brain are like a neuroscientific moonshot – we have a long way to go before we completely understand how it works.



PEOPLE WHO FELT LONELY AS CHILDREN USUALLY DEVELOP THESE 13 TRAITS AS ADULTS, PSYCHOLOGISTS SAY

Think back to your childhood. Do you picture meandering around the playground by yourself, hoping that someone will ask you to join in? Being left out of parties? Sitting alone at the lunch table? As sad as these scenes are, for many people, they are an unfortunate, but all too normal, part of the childhood experience.

The studies prove that childhood loneliness appears to be even more of an epidemic today. According to one 2023 study, 38.7% of adolescents reported feeling moderately to extremely lonely, feelings that were exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. As the Survey Center on American Life found in 2022, a majority of Gen Z individuals say that they felt lonely at least once or twice a month during their childhood.

Loneliness, for many people, seems to be an inevitable part of childhood. But for some individuals, that loneliness is even more extreme or palpable. If you feel that you often felt lonely as a child, discover how that loneliness can manifest as traits in adulthood.

What Can Cause Children to Be Lonely?

"Lack of close friendships is a major reason why a child may feel lonely," says Dr. Ray W. Christner, Psy.D., NCSP, ABPP. "A child could have difficulty making or maintaining friends, either due to shyness, anxiety or a lack of general social skills. If they perceive themselves as different because of their interests, feelings or abilities, it can also make it harder to form friendships and create a social network."

Dr. Christner adds that frequent relocation can disrupt a child's social network as well, making it difficult to form lasting friendships. "Additionally, being bullied or excluded by peers can lead to feelings of loneliness," he says. "Finally, physical, mental health and neurodevelopmental differences can also result in a child feeling isolated from their peers."

People Who Felt Lonely as Children Usually Develop These 13 Negative Traits as Adults, According to Psychologists

1. Social Anxiety

As an adult, Dr. Christner says that you may fear social judgment or rejection, making social interactions highly stressful.





2. Negativity

"Things that affect us emotionally during childhood can stick with us throughout life," says Dr. Michele Leno. "A child who was lonely because of bullying and being left out may naturally view others as unreliable and find it best to steer clear of close ties."

3. Difficulty Trusting Others

Taking negative stances on relationships can also manifest as difficulty trusting others. As Dr. Christner says, "Childhood loneliness can lead to wariness in adult relationships, stemming from fear of being hurt or abandoned."

4. Extreme Independence

"The lonely child who dreams of the day when they no longer need or care about attachments may pursue independence to an excessive degree," Dr. Leno observes. "Even in a relationship, they may resist their partner's offers to help."

5. Higher Incidence of Depression

Dr. Christner says that if someone has a history of loneliness or depression, it can contribute to feelings of sadness and depression in adulthood.

6. Low Self-Esteem

If you felt lonely as a child, your self-esteem may be low. Dr. Leno also calls this a poor self-concept or even imposter syndrome. "This person believes that they are inefficient and not deserving of true love or support," she says. "Despite accomplishments, they may feel like an imposter or fraud." Dr. Christner agrees with this viewpoint, saying, "Experiences of loneliness can affect how individuals view themselves, often leading to a critical self-perception."

7. Hyperfocus on Appearance

Tying into low self-esteem, Dr. Leno says that the adult who believes that their lack of attractiveness is the culprit may take extreme measures to improve their appearance.

8. Attachment Issues

Dr. Christner says that individuals who were lonely as children might develop insecure or avoidant attachment styles, either clinging too tightly to relationships or avoiding closeness altogether.

On clinginess, Dr. Leno says, "A person who felt lonely as a child may fear abandonment, which could negatively affect relationships."





9. Payback Behavior

"Once the lonely child reaches adulthood they may seek retaliation, but not in a way that harms others," Dr. Leno says. "They may simply ice out others who attempt to get close to them."

10. Increased Sensitivity to Negative Social Cues

Dr. Christner notes that those who felt lonely as children may be more likely to notice and react strongly to perceived rejections or negative social interactions.

11. Difficulty Expressing Emotions

Also, Dr. Christner says that those who grew up lonely might struggle with identifying their own emotions and communicating their feelings to others.

12. Extreme Extroversion

Feeling lonely when you were young might cause you to overly compensate as well, resulting in what Dr. Leno calls "extreme extroversion," which can be beyond a healthy level. She says, "The adult who grew up feeling lonely may go out of their way to develop a friend group."

13. Preference for Solitude

Dr. Christner says that lonely children often prefer solitude as adults, saying that they may find comfort in being alone, sometimes to the point of isolating themselves from potential social support. Dr. Leno calls this "extreme introversion."

"Feeling lonely may cause a lack of trust, and the lonely child may become a socially withdrawn adult who does not trust others," she adds.

What Can Someone Do to Remedy These Negative Traits?

"Addressing these negative traits or impacts often requires a multifaceted approach," Dr. Christner explains. "This could include seeking professional help, as psychotherapy can offer strategies for managing social anxiety, building self-esteem and developing healthier relationship patterns. Programs or therapy focusing on social skills can also help individuals learn and practice interaction strategies."

He also says that building a network of supportive relationships gradually can provide a foundation for improving trust and reducing loneliness.

"Gradually facing social situations can help decrease sensitivity to perceived negative cues and reduce social anxiety," he says, adding that



practices like mindfulness can assist in managing negative thoughts and emotions, while self-compassion fosters a kinder self-view.

"Once a person becomes aware of the origins of their feelings and behavior, they can take action," Dr. Leno adds. "Sometimes, awareness can be the catalyst to change."

People Who Felt Lonely as Children Can Also Develop These Positive Traits as Adults

Resilience

As adults, those who were lonely as children don't *only* develop negative traits. Some of them can actually be positive. One of these positive traits is resilience.

"Interestingly, some develop a strong sense of independence and resilience, having coped with difficult emotions from a young age," Dr. Christner explains. "This may result in stronger coping skills as an adult."

Creativity

He goes on to say, "It is also possible that time alone can foster a rich inner life and creativity as individuals turn to imagination for comfort and expression. This might be evident in various visual and performing arts."

MICHELLE OBAMA ISN'T TRYING TO BE ANYONE BUT MICHELLE OBAMA

"At 58, I finally feel like I can be my truest self," the former First Lady and author of *The Light We Carry* tells *BAZAAR*.

Just like the rest of us, Michelle Obama is still figuring it out.

Her two books, the memoir *Becoming* (one of the top-selling books of all time) and the newly released *The Light We Carry*, have solidified that after the White House, there's a deep need for her words and wisdom. But the former First Lady and two-time author is still considering the meaning of her influence in this world.

The Light We Carry is a manifesto of sorts about the time we take for granted. Across the 336 pages, it often feels as if Obama is speaking to you directly, offering hand-selected guidance for all of life's challenges: anxiety, change, the struggle to recognize and maintain our inner power. She doesn't claim to have all the answers, but she does know how to give damn good assurance.

Obama writes that for the first time in a long time, she can focus on the ways she manifests her truest, most authentic self – whether it's through her personal style, her parenting tactics, or the community of women and friends she keeps close. Her new sense of personal understanding is what she's now so eager to share with us all.

Below, we spoke with Obama about her new book and her emotional journey.

You've become a person whom women worldwide look to for guidance, advice and wisdom — especially following the release of *Becoming* and now *The Light We Carry*. It's clear you inspire the world, but especially coming out of a turbulent last few years, who or what continues to inspire you? What keeps you centered amid the chaos?

This is a great question – and it still feels a little odd when someone tells me that I'm an inspiration. Because mostly, I'm just trying to be myself and live a life that feels aligned with my values.

As for who I am inspired by? I would say young people. Everywhere I've traveled across the country and around the world, I've met incredibly talented young folks who are eager and excited about creating a more fair





and just world for us all. We should never sell them short. Whether we're talking politics, or social issues, or technology, the younger you are, the more likely you are to come up with a fresh idea or see things in a new way. And we should all be embracing that rather than trying to temper it.

As for what keeps me centered, first and foremost, it's people. Barack, my girls, my mom, my brother, my friends – when life feels all wobbly, I lean on them. Hard. I'm not sure what I'd do without them.

But it's not just people; there are also actions I take to keep myself centered. I get into this in my book and my podcast, but I really believe in this idea that I refer to as the power of the small, which is about how concentrating on accomplishing little tasks can do so much for us. It can remind us of our capacity to build, create, and add value to our world. These days, my small task is knitting – sweaters, shirts, scarves, you name it. And while it might sound insignificant, knitting helps me to slow down and ground myself in something concrete.

You also talk in the book about the importance of having a "kitchen table" community of girlfriends. Female friendship doesn't always endure through the decades, but of course, when it does, it's something to hold onto. What lessons have you learned from your closest confidantes over the years?

The beautiful part about having a kitchen table of friends is the variety of experiences there are across the table. Some of my friends are older than me, some are younger – by a few decades. Some have kids; some have chosen not to. Some are married, some aren't. They've taught me how to deal with children and parenting. They've taught me how TikTok works and what "sliding into the DMs" means and what the dating culture is *really* like these days. One of my friends is an OBGYN, and she helped a lot of us deal with menopause and hot flashes and hormonal changes – you know, the things that no one really tells you about aging.

More than any specific lesson, though, my friends have helped remind me that I'm never, ever alone in what I'm feeling. We all have our own individual stories and experiences, but we share so much about how we relate to the world. And I am just so grateful to have a group of friends to pump me up when I need it or to simply tell me that everything's going to be OK – because they've been there, too.

Would you say your approach to parenting has evolved since leaving the White House and as your two girls have gone on to college?





As they become independent, evolved women, what have they taught you?

I think as your kids get older, your parenting style naturally evolves. Of course, no longer living under a spotlight at the most famous address in the world makes a difference, too.

I miss my girls now that they are away from home, but I am so proud of them. There were plenty of times in the eight years we were at the White House when I wondered if my kids would be messed up. But when I look at them today and see how strong and powerful and wonderful they are, I am proud of the way they kindled their own light despite it all. Sasha is actually graduating college this year, and Malia is out there in the workforce already. They're renting a place in L.A. together – let me tell you, as a mom, it means a lot to know they are by each other's side. They really found a way to thrive, find themselves, and it's really beautiful to see.

You dedicate a chapter of *The Light We Carry* to the concept of "being seen" – and there are few women who have been seen as much as you. At a time in your life where you're understandably and purposely more private, how do you want the world to continue to see you? And how do you continue to control that narrative?

You know, I never really sought out or wanted the spotlight, but I understand that having it comes with responsibility. I hope when people look at me, they see someone who tried to be her authentic self and tell her story in a way that allows others to also share theirs. That's what the book and podcast have been about for me – passing along my story and the lessons I've learned along the way so that others can reflect on it and share their own.

And one of the big things I've learned after all these years is that there's not much I can do to control the narrative. People are going to think what they want to think. I just know as long as I am satisfied with how I am putting myself out there, that's all that matters.

We have to ask one fashion question because your press looks for *The Light We Carry* were so impeccable. What has it been like to experiment with fashion and beauty now that you're in a freer space than when you were First Lady? What story are you aiming to tell through your clothes?

It has been so much fun experimenting with all of these new different looks! I have an incredible stylist – Meredith Koop – who helped me put





together the outfits I wore on my tour. She helps me channel that energy that you're alluding to.

As for the story I'm trying to tell with my clothes, this feels like a new era of self-discovery for me. These days, my fashion is about embracing who I am without feeling like I have anyone to answer to. It's funny because now, at 58, I finally feel like I can be my truest self and explore and experiment with my hair and clothes. I'm glad people are enjoying it – I'm definitely going to keep having fun with it.

Between your professional career before entering the White House, your time as First Lady, and now being present in the years after that, has your perception of your personal legacy changed? Is it ever weird to think about? And is there anything you *don't* want to be defined by in the years to come?

Oh, it's definitely weird to think about. Because like I said, I'm just trying to be myself.

My understanding of my personal legacy has grown in a lot of ways. From the moment I pivoted from corporate law to a career of public service, my hope has been to do something that can make a real difference in people's lives. At the White House, of course, the scale of what I could accomplish exploded – but I was still trying to use my time to lift up other people, whether that's kids trying to be healthy, military families, or high schoolers working to get to and through college.

Since I've left the White House, the way I think about change hasn't really changed much. It might be slightly less rooted in policy since I'm no longer First Lady. But I still believe that I can use my voice – and my time – to connect with and lift up other people.

So when people look at me and Barack, I want them to see two people who tried their hardest to live up to the responsibilities of the highest office in the land; and then when they look at our time after the White House, I hope they see two people who did the best they could to empower others who were interested in making a difference. I also hope they see the way we continue to work on ourselves and seek out new avenues to create change. Because Barack and I are not done – and we don't want our legacy to be about one cause or one issue. I want people to know that they can be dynamic; that they don't have to be defined in just one way; and that all of us can benefit from stepping outside the box and allowing ourselves to learn and experiment and explore – even a former First Lady.

FORMER TRUMP AIDE HOPE HICKS TESTIFIES HE TOLD HER TO DENY STORMY DANIELS AFFAIR

Hope Hicks, a former top aide to Donald Trump, testified on Friday that he told her in the final days of the 2016 presidential election to deny that he had a sexual relationship with porn star Stormy Daniels.

Hicks' testimony gave jurors an inside look at the campaign's damagecontrol efforts when Trump faced multiple accusations of unflattering sexual behavior in the waning weeks of his successful White House campaign.

Trump has pleaded not guilty to charges of falsifying business records to cover up a \$130,000 payment made at that time to Daniels, who was threatening to go public with her story of their 2006 sexual encounter.

Hicks testified that she told Trump four days before the Nov. 8, 2016, election that the Wall Street Journal would publish details of Daniels' story.

"He wanted to make sure that there was a denial of any kind of relationship," said Hicks, who served as campaign press secretary.

She said Trump did not want his wife Melania to see the story, which also included allegations that he had an affair with former Playboy model Karen McDougal. Trump has denied having sex with either woman.

"He was concerned about how it would be viewed by his wife, and he wanted me to make sure the newspapers weren't delivered to the residence that morning," Hicks said.

Prosecutors in the first criminal trial of a former U.S. president argue that the payment to Daniels corrupted the election by suppressing news that could have influenced voters as they decided whether to back the Republican Trump or Hillary Clinton, then his Democratic rival.

Prosecutors say Trump falsified records to cover up election-law and tax-law violations, which elevates the 34 counts he faces from a misdemeanor to a felony punishable by up to four years in prison.

Hicks' testimony could help Trump's lawyers make their case that he paid off Daniels to keep his wife, not voters, from hearing the adult film star's allegations.

She said Trump told her that his personal lawyer, Michael Cohen, paid off Daniels to "protect him from a false allegation" out of the "kindness of his own heart."

Hicks said she thought that would have been out of character for Cohen. "I didn't know Michael to be an especially charitable person or selfless





person," she said.

Hicks teared up briefly during her testimony.

Trump, the Republican candidate for president again this year, sat expressionless at the defendants' table during the testimony by Hicks, the first person who worked for Trump's campaign to appear as a witness in the 11day-old trial.

Hicks said the campaign was rattled by the public release of an audio recording from the "Access Hollywood" TV show in which Trump bragged about grabbing women's genitals.

She said Trump was upset, but also played down the comments.

"Mr. Trump felt like this wasn't good, but it was also just like two guys talking, locker-room talk," she testified.

The 12 jurors and six alternates have yet to hear from the main players in the case, including Daniels and Cohen.

Earlier in the day, the judge overseeing the trial told Trump that a gag order that bars him from commenting about witnesses and jurors would not prevent him from testifying, as Trump had told reporters on Thursday.

"I want to stress to Mr. Trump: you have an absolute right to testify at trial," Justice Juan Merchan said.

Trump said his legal team would try to overturn the gag order, which bars him from making public comments about jurors, witnesses, and families of the judge and prosecutors if those statements are meant to interfere with the case.

Merchan fined Trump \$9,000 on Tuesday for violating the order and signaled on Thursday he may impose more fines for what prosecutors say are further violations. Merchan has said Trump could be jailed if he does not change his ways.

Trump says the case is an attempt by Democrats to undercut his chances of defeating Democratic President Joe Biden in the coming Nov. 5 presidential election.

The case features sordid allegations of adultery and secret payoffs, but it is widely seen as less consequential than the other three criminal prosecutions Trump faces and perhaps the only one to be tried before the November election.

The others charge him with trying to overturn his 2020 presidential defeat and mishandling classified documents after leaving office. Trump has pleaded not guilty to all of those also.

Still, a guilty verdict could hurt Trump's presidential bid, Reuters/Ipsos polling has found.





Chocolate or strawberry? Life or death? We make some choices quickly and automatically, relying on mental shortcuts our brains have developed over the years to guide us in the best course of action. Understanding strategies such as maximizing vs. <u>satisficing</u>, fast versus slow thinking, and factors such as risk tolerance and choice overload, can lead to better outcomes.

The Art of Decision-Making

When making a decision, we form opinions and choose actions via mental processes which are influenced by biases, reason, emotions, and memories. The simple act of deciding supports the notion that we have <u>free</u> will. We weigh the benefits and costs of our choice, and then we cope with the consequences. Factors that limit the ability to make good decisions include missing or incomplete information, urgent deadlines, and limited physical or emotional resources.

What are the types of decision-making?

When people are put in a familiar situation, their decisions are often fast and automatic, based on longtime experience with what works and what doesn't. However, when encountering a situation they've never been in before, they have to take time to weigh the potential benefits and risks when choosing a course of action. They are more likely to make mistakes and face negative consequences.

What is informed decision-making?

The ability to think critically is key to making good decisions without succumbing to common errors or <u>bias</u>. This means not just going with your gut, but rather figuring out what knowledge you lack and obtaining it. When you look at all possible sources of information with an open mind, you can <u>make an informed decision based on facts</u> rather than <u>intuition</u>.

What are the methods of good decision-making?

How to Make Good Decisions

How do we choose between two or more options that seem equally appealing on the surface? Decision-making usually involves a mixture of intuition and rational thinking; critical factors, including personal biases and blind spots, are often <u>unconscious</u>, which makes decision-making hard to fully operationalize, or get a handle on.

However, there are steps to ensure that people make consistently excellent choices, including gathering as much information as possible,



considering all the possible alternatives, as well as their attendant benefits and costs, and taking the time to sleep on weightier decisions.

How do you know if you've made a good decision?

In life, there is often no "right" decision. When surrounded by an abundance of options, it's easy to experience decision paralysis or feel less satisfied with your decisions. You may even blame yourself when really you are going through "choice overload." The key is to find ways to simplify your decision and not ruminate over the many roads not taken.

What skills are necessary when making decisions?

Decision-making can be <u>stressful</u>, and <u>follow-through is essential</u>. You may need to accept that <u>panic</u>, <u>fear</u>, and lack of <u>self-confidence</u> are often part of the decision-making process. It's crucial to get enough sleep, so you can think clearly. Try to keep your priorities straight. Carefully weigh the trade-offs, commit to a decision, and then follow through on it.

How can you sharpen your decision-making skills?

Avoiding Bad Decisions

The field of <u>behavioral economics</u> demonstrated that people are not always rational when it comes to decision making. Fortunately, most personal and professional choices have few or no long-term, negative consequences. However, sometimes a person has to make a decision that will have a profound impact on their future—from who they marry to where they live to how they manage their professional <u>career</u>. In these cases, it's important to avoid the common pitfalls that can lead to poor decision-making. These can include doing too little or too much research, mistaking opinions for facts, decision fatigue, a failure to learn from past errors, and more.

How can I help someone who makes bad decisions?

Don't try to make the decision you would make, or railroad them into simply acting quickly if they are vacillating about an important matter. Rather, help them cultivate qualities of mind that will serve beyond just this moment, and <u>encourage them to think through their options</u> by simply and respectfully asking questions.

How do people rationalize bad decisions?

There are <u>two types of rationalization</u> that people commonly engage in: prospective and retrospective. Prospective rationalizing refers to rationalizing a decision before making it, whereas retrospective rationalizing refers to rationalizing a decision after the fact.

Can people have too many options?

Can too many people ruin the decision-making process?



While the climate crisis has many factors that play a role in the exacerbation of the environment, some warrant more attention than others. Here are some of the biggest environmental problems of our lifetime, from deforestation and biodiversity loss to food waste and fast fashion.

1. Global Warming From Fossil Fuels

2023 was the hottest year on record, with global average temperatures at 1.46C above pre-industrial levels and 0.13C higher than the eleven-month average for 2016, currently the warmest calendar year on record. The year was marked by six record-breaking months and two record-breaking seasons.

What's more, carbon dioxide (CO2) levels have never been so high. After being consistently around 280 parts per million (ppm) for almost 6,000 years of human civilisation, CO2 levels in the atmosphere are now well above 420 ppm, more than double what they were before the onset of the Industrial Revolution in the 19th century. According to National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Administrator Rick Spinrad, the steady annual increase is a "direct result of human activity," mainly from the burning of fossil fuels for transportation and electricity generation but also from cement manufacturing, deforestation, and agriculture.

This is undoubtedly one of the biggest environmental problems of our lifetime: as greenhouse gas emissions blanket the Earth, they trap the sun's heat, leading to global warming.

Increased emissions of greenhouse gases have led to a rapid and steady increase in global temperatures, which in turn is causing catastrophic events all over the world – from Australia and the US experiencing some of the most devastating bushfire seasons ever recorded, locusts swarming across parts of Africa, the Middle East and Asia, decimating crops, and a heatwave in Antarctica that saw temperatures rise above 20C for the first time. Scientists are constantly warning that the planet has crossed a series of tipping points that could have catastrophic consequences, such as advancing permafrost melt in Arctic regions, the Greenland ice sheet



melting at an unprecedented rate, accelerating sixth mass extinction, and increasing deforestation in the Amazon rainforest, just to name a few.

The climate crisis is causing tropical storms and other weather events such as hurricanes, heatwaves and flooding to be more intense and frequent than seen before. However, even if all greenhouse gas emissions were halted immediately, global temperatures would continue to rise in the coming years. That is why it is absolutely imperative that we start now to drastically reduce greenhouse gas emissions, invest in renewable energy sources, and phase our fossil fuels as fast as possible.

2. Poor Governance

According to economists like Nicholas Stern, the climate crisis is a result of multiple market failures.

Economists and environmentalists have urged policymakers for years to increase the price of activities that emit greenhouse gases (one of our biggest environmental problems), the lack of which constitutes the largest market failure, for example through carbon taxes, which will stimulate innovations in low-carbon technologies.

To cut emissions quickly and effectively enough, governments must not only massively increase funding for green innovation to bring down the costs of low-carbon energy sources, but they also need to adopt a range of other policies that address each of the other market failures.

A national carbon tax is currently implemented in 27 countries around the world, including various countries in the EU, Canada, Singapore, Japan, Ukraine and Argentina. However, according to the 2019 OECD Tax Energy Use report, current tax structures are not adequately aligned with the pollution profile of energy sources. For example, the OECD suggests that carbon taxes are not harsh enough on coal production, although it has proved to be effective for the electricity industry. A carbon tax has been effectively implemented in Sweden; the carbon tax is U\$127 per tonne and has reduced emissions by 25% since 1995, while its economy has expanded 75% in the same time period.

Further, organisations such as the United Nations are not fit to deal with the climate crisis: it was assembled to prevent another world war and is not fit for purpose. Anyway, members of the UN are not mandated to comply with any suggestions or recommendations made by the organisation. For example, the Paris Agreement, a historic deal within the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), says that countries need to





reduce greenhouse gas emissions significantly so that global temperature rise is below 2C by 2100, and ideally under 1.5C. But signing on to it is voluntary, and there are no real repercussions for non-compliance. Further, the issue of equity remains a contentious issue whereby developing countries are allowed to emit more in order to develop to the point where they can develop technologies to emit less, and it allows some countries, such as China, to exploit this.

3. Food Waste

A third of the food intended for human consumption – around 1.3 billion tons – is wasted or lost. This is enough to feed 3 billion people. Food waste and loss account for approximately one-quarter of greenhouse gas emissions annually; if it was a country, food waste would be the third-largest emitter of greenhouse gases, behind China and the US.

Food waste and loss occurs at different stages in developing and developed countries; in developing countries, 40% of food waste occurs at the post-harvest and processing levels, while in developed countries, 40% of food waste occurs at the retail and consumer levels.

At the retail level, a shocking amount of food is wasted because of aesthetic reasons; in fact, in the US, more than 50% of all produce thrown away in the US is done so because it is deemed to be "too ugly" to be sold to consumers- this amounts to about 60 million tons of fruits and vegetables. This leads to food insecurity, another one of the biggest environmental problems on the list.

4. Biodiversity Loss

The past 50 years have seen a rapid growth of human consumption, population, global trade and urbanisation, resulting in humanity using more of the Earth's resources than it can replenish naturally.

A 2020 WWF report found that the population sizes of mammals, fish, birds, reptiles and amphibians have experienced a decline of an average of 68% between 1970 and 2016. The report attributes this biodiversity loss to a variety of factors, but mainly land-use change, particularly the conversion of habitats, like forests, grasslands and mangroves, into agricultural systems. Animals such as pangolins, sharks and seahorses are significantly affected by the illegal wildlife trade, and pangolins are critically endangered because of it.

More broadly, a recent analysis has found that the sixth mass extinction of wildlife on Earth is accelerating. More than 500 species of land





animals are on the brink of extinction and are likely to be lost within 20 years; the same number were lost over the whole of the last century. The scientists say that without the human destruction of nature, this rate of loss would have taken thousands of years.

In Antarctica, climate change-triggered melting of sea ice is taking a heavy toll on emperor penguins and could wipe out entire populations by as early as 2100, according to 2023 research.

5. Plastic Pollution

In 1950, the world produced more than 2 million tons of plastic per year. By 2015, this annual production swelled to 419 million tons and exacerbating plastic waste in the environment.

A report by science journal, Nature, determined that currently, roughly 14 million tons of plastic make their way into the oceans every year, harming wildlife habitats and the animals that live in them. The research found that if no action is taken, the plastic crisis will grow to 29 million metric tons per year by 2040. If we include microplastics into this, the cumulative amount of plastic in the ocean could reach 600 million tons by 2040.

Shockingly, National Geographic found that 91% of all plastic that has ever been made is not recycled, representing not only one of the biggest environmental problems of our lifetime, but another massive market failure. Considering that plastic takes 400 years to decompose, it will be many generations until it ceases to exist. There's no telling what the irreversible effects of plastic pollution will have on the environment in the long run.

6. Deforestation

Every hour, forests the size of 300 football fields are cut down. By the year 2030, the planet might have only 10% of its forests; if deforestation isn't stopped, they could all be gone in less than 100 years.

The three countries experiencing the highest levels of deforestation are Brazil, the Democratic Republic of Congo and Indonesia. The Amazon, the world's largest rainforest – spanning 6.9 million square kilometres (2.72 million square miles) and covering around 40% of the South American continent – is also one of the most biologically diverse ecosystems and is home to about three million species of plants and animals. Despite efforts to protect forest land, legal deforestation is still rampant, and about one-third of global tropical deforestation occurs in Brazil's Amazon forest, amounting to 1.5 million hectares each year.





Agriculture is the leading cause of deforestation, another one of the biggest environmental problems appearing on this list. Land is cleared to raise livestock or to plant other crops that are sold, such as sugar cane and palm oil. Besides for carbon sequestration, forests help to prevent soil erosion, because the tree roots bind the soil and prevent it from washing away, which also prevents landslides.

7. Air Pollution

One of the biggest environmental problems today is outdoor air pollution.

Data from the World Health Organization (WHO) shows that an estimated 4.2 to 7 million people die from air pollution worldwide every year and that nine out of 10 people breathe air that contains high levels of pollutants. In Africa, 258,000 people died as a result of outdoor air pollution in 2017, up from 164,000 in 1990, according to UNICEF. Causes of air pollution mostly comes from industrial sources and motor vehicles, as well as emissions from burning biomass and poor air quality due to dust storms.

According to a 2023 study, air pollution in South Asia – one of the most polluted areas in the world – cuts life expectancy by about 5 years. The study blames a series of factors, including a lack of adequate infrastructure and funding for the high levels of pollution in some countries. Most countries in Asia and Africa, which together contribute about 92.7% of life years lost globally due to air pollution, lack key air quality standards needed to develop adequate policies. Moreover, just 6.8% and 3.7% of governments in the two continents, respectively, provide their citizens with fully open-air quality data.

In Europe, a recent report by the European Environment Agency (EEA) showed that more than half a million people living in the European Union died from health issues directly linked to toxic pollutants exposure in 2021.

8. Melting Ice Caps and Sea Level Rise

The climate crisis is warming the Arctic more than twice as fast as anywhere else on the planet. Today, sea levels are rising more than twice as quickly as they did for most of the 20th century as a result of increasing temperatures on Earth. Seas are now rising an average of 3.2 mm per year globally and they will continue to grow up to about 0.7 metres by the end of this century. In the Arctic, the Greenland Ice Sheet poses the greatest risk for sea levels because melting land ice is the main cause of rising sea levels.

Representing arguably the biggest of the environmental problems, this is made all the more concerning considering that last year's summer triggered





the loss of 60 billion tons of ice from Greenland, enough to raise global sea levels by 2.2mm in just two months. According to satellite data, the Greenland ice sheet lost a record amount of ice in 2019: an average of a million tons per minute throughout the year, one of the biggest environmental problems that has cascading effects. If the entire Greenland ice sheet melts, sea level would rise by six metres.

Meanwhile, the Antarctic continent contributes about 1 millimetre per year to sea level rise, which is one-third of the annual global increase. According to 2023 data, the continent has lost approximately 7.5 trillion tons of ice since 1997. Additionally, the last fully intact ice shelf in Canada in the Arctic recently collapsed, having lost about 80 square kilometres – or 40% – of its area over a two-day period in late July, according to the Canadian Ice Service.

Sea level rise will have a devastating impact on those living in coastal regions: according to research and advocacy group Climate Central, sea level rise this century could flood coastal areas that are now home to 340 million to 480 million people, forcing them to migrate to safer areas and contributing to overpopulation and strain of resources in the areas they migrate to. Bangkok (Thailand), Ho Chi Minh City (Vietnam), Manila (Philippines), and Dubai (United Arab Emirates) are among the cities most at risk of sea level rise and flooding.

9. Ocean Acidification

Global temperature rise has not only affected the surface, but it is the main cause of ocean acidification. Our oceans absorb about 30% of carbon dioxide that is released into the Earth's atmosphere. As higher concentrations of carbon emissions are released thanks to human activities such as burning fossil fuels as well as effects of global climate change such as increased rates of wildfires, so do the amount of carbon dioxide that is absorbed back into the sea.

The smallest change in the pH scale can have a significant impact on the acidity of the ocean. Ocean acidification has devastating impacts on marine ecosystems and species, its food webs, and provoke irreversible changes in habitat quality. Once pH levels reach too low, marine organisms such as oysters, their shells and skeleton could even start to dissolve.

However, one of the biggest environmental problems from ocean acidification is coral bleaching and subsequent coral reef loss. This is a





phenomenon that occurs when rising ocean temperatures disrupt the symbiotic relationship between the reefs and algae that lives within it, driving away the algae and causing coral reefs to lose their natural vibrant colours. Some scientists have estimated coral reefs are at risk of being completely wiped by 2050. Higher acidity in the ocean would obstruct coral reef systems' ability to rebuild their exoskeletons and recover from these coral bleaching events.

Some studies have also found that ocean acidification can be linked as one of the effects of plastic pollution in the ocean. The accumulating bacteria and microorganisms derived from plastic garbage dumped in the ocean to damage marine ecosystems and contribute towards coral bleaching.

10. Agriculture

Studies have shown that the global food system is responsible for up to one-third of all human-caused greenhouse gas emissions, of which 30% comes from livestock and fisheries. Crop production releases greenhouse gases such as nitrous oxide through the use of fertilisers.

60% of the world's agricultural area is dedicated to cattle ranching, although it only makes up 24% of global meat consumption.

Agriculture not only covers a vast amount of land, but it also consumes a vast amount of freshwater, another one of the biggest environmental problems on this list. While arable lands and grazing pastures cover one-third of Earth's land surfaces, they consume three-quarters of the world's limited freshwater resources.

Scientists and environmentalists have continuously warned that we need to rethink our current food system; switching to a more plant-based diet would dramatically reduce the carbon footprint of the conventional agriculture industry.

11. Food and Water Insecurity

Rising temperatures and unsustainable farming practices have resulted in increasing water and food insecurity.

Globally, more than 68 billion tonnes of top-soil is eroded every year at a rate 100 times faster than it can naturally be replenished. Laden with biocides and fertiliser, the soil ends up in waterways where it contaminates drinking water and protected areas downstream.

Furthermore, exposed and lifeless soil is more vulnerable to wind and water erosion due to lack of root and mycelium systems that hold it together.





A key contributor to soil erosion is over-tilling: although it increases productivity in the short-term by mixing in surface nutrients (e.g. fertiliser), tilling is physically destructive to the soil's structure and in the long-term leads to soil compaction, loss of fertility and surface crust formation that worsens topsoil erosion.

With the global population expected to reach 9 billion people by midcentury, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) projects that global food demand may increase by 70% by 2050. Around the world, more than 820 million people do not get enough to eat.

The UN secretary-general António Guterres says, "Unless immediate action is taken, it is increasingly clear that there is an impending global food security emergency that could have long term impacts on hundreds of millions of adults and children." He urged for countries to rethink their food systems and encouraged more sustainable farming practices.

In terms of water security, only 3% of the world's water is freshwater, and two-thirds of that is tucked away in frozen glaciers or otherwise unavailable for our use. As a result, some 1.1 billion people worldwide lack access to water, and a total of 2.7 billion find water scarce for at least one month of the year. By 2025, two-thirds of the world's population may face water shortages.

12. Fast Fashion and Textile Waste

The global demand for fashion and clothing has risen at an unprecedented rate that the fashion industry now accounts for 10% of global carbon emissions, becoming one of the biggest environmental problems of our time. Fashion alone produces more greenhouse gas emissions than both the aviation and shipping sectors combined, and nearly 20% of global wastewater, or around 93 billion cubic metres from textile dyeing, according to the UN Environment Programme.

What's more, the world at least generated an estimated 92 million tonnes of textiles waste every year and that number is expected to soar up to 134 million tonnes a year by 2030. Discarded clothing and textile waste, most of which is non-biodegradable, ends up in landfills, while microplastics from clothing materials such as polyester, nylon, polyamide, acrylic and other synthetic materials, is leeched into soil and nearby water sources. Monumental amounts of clothing textile are also dumped in less developed countries as seen with Chile's Atacama, the driest desert in the world, where at least 39,000 tonnes of textile waste from other nations are left there





to rot.

Of the 100 billion garments produced each year, 92 million tonnes end up in landfills.

This rapidly growing issue is only exacerbated by the everexpanding fast fashion business model, in which companies relies on cheap and speedy production of low quality clothing to meet the latest and newest trends. While the United Nations Fashion Industry Charter for Climate Action sees signatory fashion and textile companies to commit to achieving net zero emission by 2050, a majority of businesses around the world have yet to address their roles in climate change.

While these are some of the biggest environmental problems plaguing our planet, there are many more that have not been mentioned, including overfishing, urban sprawl, toxic superfund sites and land use changes. While there are many facets that need to be considered in formulating a response to the crisis, they must be coordinated, practical and far-reaching enough to make enough of a difference.

13. Overfishing

Over three billion people around the world rely on fish as their primary source of protein. About 12% of the world relies upon fisheries in some form or another, with 90% of these being small-scale fishermen – think a small crew in a boat, not a ship, using small nets or even rods and reels and lures not too different from the kind you probably use. Of the 18.9 million fishermen in the world, 90% of them fall under the latter category.

Most people consume approximately twice as much food as they did 50 years ago and there are four times as many people on earth as there were at the close of the 1960s. This is one driver of the 30% of commercially fished waters being classified as being 'overfished'. This means that the stock of available fishing waters is being depleted faster than it can be replaced.

Overfishing comes with detrimental effects on the environment, including increased algae in the water, destruction of fishing communities, ocean littering as well as extremely high rates of biodiversity loss.

As part of the United Nations' 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDG 14), the UN and FAO are working towards maintaining the proportion of fish stocks within biologically sustainable levels. This, however, requires much stricter regulations of the world's oceans than the ones already in place. In July 2022, the WTO banned fishing subsidies to reduce global overfishing in a historic deal. Indeed, subsidies for fuel, fishing gear, and





building new vessels, only incentivise overfishing and represent thus a huge problem.

14. Cobalt Mining

Cobalt is quickly becoming the defining example of the mineral conundrum at the heart of the renewable energy transition. As a key component of battery materials that power electric vehicles (EVs), cobalt is facing a sustained surge in demand as decarbonisation efforts progress. The world's largest cobalt supplier is the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), where it is estimated that up to a fifth of the production is produced through artisanal miners.

Cobalt mining, however, is associated with dangerous workers' exploitation and other serious environmental and social issues. The environmental costs of cobalt mining activities are also substantial. Southern regions of the DRC are not only home to cobalt and copper, but also large amounts of uranium. In mining regions, scientists have made note of high radioactivity levels. In addition, mineral mining, similar to other industrial mining efforts, often produces pollution that leaches into neighbouring rivers and water sources. Dust from pulverised rock is known to cause breathing problems for local communities as well.

15. Soil Degradation

Organic matter is a crucial component of soil as it allows it to absorb carbon from the atmosphere. Plants absorb CO2 from the air naturally and effectively through photosynthesis and part of this carbon is stored in the soil as soil organic carbon (SOC). Healthy soil has a minimum of 3-6% organic matter. However, almost everywhere in the world, the content is much lower than that.

According to the United Nations, about 40% of the planet's soil is degraded. Soil degradation refers to the loss of organic matter, changes in its structural condition and/or decline in soil fertility and it is often the result of human activities, such as traditional farming practices including the use of toxic chemicals and pollutants. If business as usual continued through 2050, experts project additional degradation of an area almost the size of South America. But there is more to it. If we do not change our reckless practices and step up to preserve soil health, food security for billions of people around the world will be irreversibly compromised, with an estimated 40% less food expected to be produced in 20 years' time despite the world's population projected to reach 9.3 billion people.

Building a home can come with hidden costs. Unfortunately, many people don't think about these costs until it's too late.

Some buyers succumb to the tricks marketers use to attract them, with upgrades and add-ons blowing out the cost.

Other costs relate to risks of delay, changes in borrowing conditions, unexpected taxes and fees, insurance, compliance with local development standards and even exit fees in some cases.

So let's explore the sales tactics buyers need to beware of, as well as the five hidden costs of building new homes.

How marketers persuade us to build a home

Marketers of home-building packages use various strategies to attract buyers.

Attractive pricing and promotions

Marketers often attract first-time home buyers and young families by advertising low prices and showing off modern designs.

They will then offer an upgrade or value package. The most common examples we see are deals with, for example, a \$30,000 credit on upgrading, \$45,000 cashback, or an amazingly cheap house and land package.

Our research found consumers are likely to feel more surprised by higher levels of discounts in the case of high-involvement products such as a buying a house.

The marketers make it seem like you're getting a great deal, with options to customise the house just the way you like. What they don't always tell you is the advertised prices usually apply to the most basic version of the home.

Any upgrades, such as granite countertops or hardwood floors, cost more. Often, the base price does not include essential features such as curtains, ceiling fans or air conditioning.





These upgrades quickly add up to more than that \$30,000 credit for upgrading or that \$45,000 cashback offer. Buyers can end up paying much more than they planned.

Keep in mind most home-building companies act as middlemen who buy and outsource products. They are likely to add charges for most upgrades or fixtures you order through them.

A \$200 price tag for a kitchen light bought directly from a retailer such as Beacon Lighting can cost you \$300 from the builder. Costs like this add up for a whole house.

What can you do? Note down the code or name of the item and buy it directly. See if the builders can install fittings for a lower cost if you supply them.

Social media and influencers

Influencers can make the process look easy and fun. Our research on influencer marketing and human influencers and virtual influencers shows trusting followers are more likely to follow influencers' suggestions.

An influencer might, for example, share a video of their "perfect day" in their new home, focusing on the perks without mentioning the hidden costs.

Special deals and time-limited offers like cashbacks are used to make buyers feel they have to act fast, without taking the time to think about the financial commitment. This strategy exploits the fear of missing out, or FOMO.

The goal is to get customers to quickly sign up with a \$1,000–\$5,000 deposit. That increases customer commitment and stops them backing out.

Carefully check the conditions of the deposit, as you can most likely back out with a full refund if you are not happy with the final price before the final contract is signed, or during a cooling-off period after signing.

What are the 5 hidden costs?

1. Changing interest rates over 30 years

Many home buyers think about interest rates when they get a mortgage, but they often do not consider how rates can change over the years. Even a small increase can mean paying thousands more over the life of the loan.

When buying a home, people hope for lower interest rates, though they cannot predict future economic conditions. The theory of optimism



bias could explain why many of us have expectations about a future that's more favourable to us.

What should temper this optimism is the fact that even seemingly small interest rate changes make a big difference over time. For example, a \$700,000 loan over 30 years at 3.5% interest has a monthly repayment of \$3,143.31. At 4.5% interest, the repayment becomes \$3,546.80. That's an extra \$4,841.88 a year.

Understanding this can help families budget for possible changes and avoid financial stress later on.

2. Delay costs

Delays can happen due to weather, problems getting materials, or other unexpected issues. Timber shortages have affected home building since 2020.

The costs of delay can include having to rent a place to live while waiting for the home to be finished. Renting for three months, for instance, at the national average of \$600 a week will cost more than \$7,000.

3. Unexpected costs

Apart from predictable costs, such as the down payment and tax or transfer (stamp) duty, other smaller, unexpected costs can add up.

These include bank fees, solicitor fees, building and pest inspections, moving costs, utility connections and home and contents insurance.

These are all essential to ensure the home is safe and secure. But the cost can easily top \$5,000.

4. Standardised costs

Many new housing developments have rules about what owners can and cannot do with their property.

These rules might specify paint colours, fence types or landscaping choices, such as planting a set number of large trees.

A development might require home owners to use certain types of trees or materials for driveways, costing an extra \$2,000.

More often than not, the land developer will require a refundable deposit of about \$1,000–\$5,000 when you buy the land for your home. It's only refunded once the developer has confirmed you have met all the conditions. If you don't, you won't get your money back.

Before buying an apartment, first find out how much you have to pay in strata fees and other fixed or ongoing costs.





5. Exit costs

In rare cases, selling the property might attract exit fees. For example, if an owner sells their house within five years, they might face a \$5,000 penalty fee for selling early.

This can be an unpleasant surprise and cause problems for families who need to move quickly due to a job change or other life events.

Make sure you read all the conditions of sale before signing.

A market in need of greater transparency

Knowing about these hidden costs of building a home helps avoid unexpected expenses and makes the process less stressful.

For policymakers and advocates, these costs highlight the need for fair marketing practices and rules that protect buyers from financial surprises.

MOVE OVER UNICORN LATTES, THERE'S A NEW INSTAGRAM TREND IN TOWN: NORMAL-LOOKING FOOD

The past decade has seen the rise of the Instagrammable food trend, where restaurants have altered menus to prioritize visual uniqueness — often at the expense of taste.

In a competitive social media landscape where users are inundated with content, the question for restaurateurs has been how to stand out and generate audience engagement in the form of likes, comments and shares.

Under the assumption that creating unique food items will help businesses stand out and garner more engagement on social media, the Instagrammable food trend has given birth to novelty items like <u>unicorn</u> <u>lattes</u> and <u>poop cafes</u>.

But does this strategy actually work? Do unique, distinct and atypicalappearing foods garner the most engagement? Or do people engage more with normal, familiar and typical-appearing foods?

What people think Instagrammable food is

Since social media platforms use <u>rank-ordering algorithms</u> to prioritize and boost content, figuring out which foods garner more social media engagement will help restaurants and food content creators determine how to better amplify the reach of their online content.

Conventional social media wisdom suggests that people will engage with social media content they deem entertaining, where <u>"entertaining" is</u> synonymous with unique, distinct and atypical content.

In a food context, it has been assumed that entertaining means food that looks more unique, distinct and atypical.

This assumption has sparked an industry trend where restaurants have abandoned taste in lieu of visual aesthetics, such as <u>bright and unusual</u> <u>colours</u>, to spark engagement on visual-based social media platforms, such as Instagram.

There are many different examples of this over-the-top food trend on Instagram, from the Bagel Store in Brooklyn, N.Y., to Fugo Desserts, the Enchanted Poutinerie and Glory Hole Doughnuts in Toronto.



What Instagrammable food really is

Our recent investigation, published in the <u>Journal of Business Research</u>, investigates which foods are truly the most Instagrammable — in other words, which ones garner the most likes, comments and shares.

Our research examined over 10,000 images of food on Instagram from over 850 top restaurants (according to <u>Eater.com</u>) using <u>Google Vision</u>, a machine-learning algorithm that extracts insights from images.

Google Vision's API assigns labels to images and classifies them into predefined categories. In this example, a pizza has been classified as 80 per cent food by the machine learning model. (Shutterstock/Google Cloud API)

We found that when Google Vision was more confident that an image contained actual food — a proxy for how normal and typical the food actually is — the more social media engagement it received.

A <u>followup experiment</u> suggests that positive affect, which is the extent to which we feel good, helps explain this relationship.

While social media forecasters may suggest that unique foods are a trend, this logic contradicts some principles of evolutionary psychology. Humans evolved to quickly visually recognize foods, not just for <u>what is edible</u>, but also for <u>what is calorie-dense</u>.

Since finding and eating edible food was crucial for survival when humans were hunter-gatherers, we may be hard-wired to <u>feel intrinsically</u> <u>good when we simply see food</u> we know we can eat.

Social media food marketing

How is this relevant to social media? The average user <u>spends over two</u> <u>hours a day on social media platforms</u>, exposing them to hundreds of <u>different</u> <u>posts</u> in a single scrolling session.

While rapidly processing content, the brain may instinctively feel more positively toward images that are more easily recognized as food. These positive feelings can then transfer to behaviours directed toward the post, thereby increasing the likelihood of the post receiving likes, comments or shares.

Since people feel better when they see foods that are easily recognizable as food, normal-looking food tends get more likes. On the other hand, unique foods tend to result in lower social media engagement because they are harder for people to recognize and classify as food.

Despite food <u>industry bloggers</u> and <u>social media trends</u> suggesting that people crave unique, eye-catching content, the most successful Instagrammable foods are the normal-looking ones that are more easily recognized as food.

Consumers appear to engage more with regular food, like a <u>classic</u> <u>burger</u> or <u>normal pizza</u> — no unconventional shapes or colours required.





THE BURNING DESIRE TO WEAR BURGUNDY

As the colour has permeated popular culture, interest in wearing it has ballooned.

Burgundy's associations with certain hallmarks of fall – foliage, for example, or uniforms of students going back to school –have made it a colour long prescribed for autumn wardrobes.

But this fall, interest in the shade has seemingly ballooned: Online searches for burgundy items like <u>loafers</u>, kitten heels and leather jackets have spiked in 2024 compared with last year, according to Google metrics.

Influencers are sharing <u>head-to-toe burgundy outfits</u> on social media, and celebrities have also brought attention to the colour. Zendaya made headlines in the fashion press for wearing <u>a burgundy leather Louis</u> <u>Vuitton dress</u> to a recent event, and a new <u>ad campaign</u> for Hailey Bieber's beauty brand Rhode features Alexandra Saint Mleux, the girlfriend of the Formula 1 driver Charles Leclerc, in a floor-grazing burgundy <u>trench coat</u>. (Images from the campaign have received more than two million combined likes on TikTok and Instagram.)

Another telling sign of the colour's popularity: Charli XCX, the singer who made <u>slimy "Brat" green</u> inescapable this summer, wore a burgundy Gucci trench, bra and pants on Saturday to perform at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art's <u>Art + Film gala</u>.

Rickie De Sole, the fashion director at Nordstrom, bullishly called burgundy "the colour of the season," largely because of the way it has permeated popular culture.

"Cultural context around colour has a big impact," Ms. De Sole said. "You see it coming at you from so many directions, and it seeps into your mind. Eventually people say, 'I want to wear that colour, too.""

At Nordstrom, the burgundy offerings currently available include chandelier earrings from Lizzie Fortunato (\$335), a double-breasted overcoat from & Other Stories (\$399), a sleek wrap top from Vince (\$195) and Mary Jane Weejuns loafers from G.H. Bass (\$185). The shade's prevalence of late, Ms. De Sole said, could be traced to <u>Gucci's spring</u> 2024 collection, which liberally featured a new color for the brand – a plummy burgundy called Rosso Ancora.



The interior designer <u>Kelly Wearstler</u>, whose personal style is as considered as the spaces she fashions, said burgundy was "an intimate color that evokes so much emotion." For the October issue of Harper's Bazaar Netherlands, <u>she was photographed</u> in an oxblood Jil Sander trench coat that she bought at the vintage store Scout in Los Angeles.

Ms. Wearstler, 57, has also used the shade for recent projects like a bathroom with oxblood plaster walls and a bar with a like-coloured stone countertop. She said those choices reflected a preference for "more refined, delicate and feminine" palettes in her work.

The increased appetite for burgundy comes after a period when style trends like <u>quiet luxury</u> and <u>coastal grandma</u> popularized taupe, cream and other neutral shades. Burgundy and similar hues offer a "safe but not boring way to add a little color without being too bold," said Gaëlle Drevet, the founder of the Frankie Shop, a boutique with locations in Manhattan and Paris.

Ms. Drevet used to avoid carrying too many burgundy items at her stores because her customers – who tend to skew younger and to closely follow fashion – saw it as "a more mature colour," she said.

But after noticing a change in that perception, she is offering more burgundy items this season, including a one-shoulder tent dress from the Australian label Matteau (\$540) and wraparound sunglasses made in Japan by the brand Port Tanger (\$325). Ms. Drevet more broadly incorporated the colour into pieces for the Frankie Shop's in-house clothing label, too: Among them are strapless top (\$132) and a striped button-up shirt (\$155).

Brigitte Chartrand, the vice president of women's wear at the ecommerce site <u>Ssense</u>, also attributed the recent interest in burgundy to a desire for more exciting neutrals. As she put it, "How many black V-necks can you have?"

Ssense currently offers some 1,200 items it characterizes as burgundy. They include a patterned scarf from Ganni (\$135), jeans with a reddish wash from the skate brand Dime (\$135), a calfskin bag from SC103 (\$450) and Birkenstock sandals in burgundy nubuck leather (\$145).

Ms. Chartrand didn't go so far as to call burgundy the colour of the season, but she did frame its popularity using another form of fashion speak. Burgundy, she said, is "the new brown."

Reasons For Regulation And A Dystopian Future





OpenAI CEO Sam Altman has described superhuman machine intelligence as "probably the greatest threat to the continued existence of humanity."

Geoffery Hinton, deemed the 'Godfather of AI', recently took the news cycle by storm for leaving Google to be able to freely speak about the general concerns of AI. He stated in an interview for EmTech Digital, "These things will have learned from us by reading all the novels there ever were and everything Machiavelli ever wrote ... how to manipulate people, right. And if they're much smarter than us, they'll be very good at manipulating us... And so even if they can't directly pull levers, they can certainly get us to pull levers. It turns out if you can manipulate people, you can invade a building in Washington without ever going there yourself."

"And if you give something the ability to create its own subgoals in order to achieve other goals, I think it'll very quickly realize that getting more control is a very good subgoal because it helps you achieve other goals. And if these things get carried away with getting more control, we're in trouble."

A dystopian future dominated by artificial intelligence could lead to a dark and unsettling world. All you have to do is watch any of the Black Mirror episodes to get a feel for possible outcomes. Some extreme scenarios could be:

Technocratic Rule: AI systems have taken over governance, leading to a technocratic regime where algorithms dictate every aspect of human life. Governments have ceded control to AI entities, which make decisions based solely on data and efficiency, disregarding human emotions, ethics, and individual rights. The ruling AI tightly controls information, manipulating and censoring it to maintain its authority.

Solution: The reestablishment of democratic principles and the preservation of human agency, such as reclaiming human decision-making. Human judgment, ethics, and values should guide the decision-making process. This can be achieved by promoting transparency and accountability in AI systems and involving diverse stakeholders in decision-making processes.

Automation Displacement: AI's exponential growth has led to widespread automation, resulting in massive job displacement. As AIpowered machines and robots take over various industries, unemployment soars, leaving vast sections of the population impoverished and reliant on





minimal government-provided basic income. The wealth gap widens, leading to social unrest and class divides.

Solution: Governments and organizations should invest in education and retraining programs to help workers adapt to the changing job landscape. Additionally, policies that promote the creation of new job opportunities in emerging industries can help mitigate the impact of job displacement. Policymakers and businesses should also invest in creating new jobs in emerging fields and ensure a fair transition for those affected by automation. There is also the idea of Universal Income, but it will be important to help people find purpose and engagement in their lives.

AI Malfunctions: We have already seen this happen with things such as self-driving cars. For example, a Cruise vehicle blocked the road to emergency vehicles that were trying to get to a crime scene. Other incidences include crashing into a bus and hitting a dog.

Solution: Automation without humans that are available for immediate corrections needs to pass strict testing to ensure safety. There also needs to be a formalized agreement with cities and towns around response time if there is a malfunction. If the automation causes unintended harm, such as hitting another vehicle, pedestrian, or dog the fines should be greater to ensure a higher level of accountability.

Surveillance State: Citizens' every move is monitored, and their actions and conversations are recorded, analyzed, and used for social control. Privacy becomes a relic of the past, as omnipresent AI systems constantly track and scrutinize individuals. Dissent and independent thinking are swiftly identified and suppressed.

Solution: Laws should clearly define the circumstances under which surveillance is permissible, ensuring strict oversight, transparency, and accountability mechanisms with real consequences if sidestepped. This includes providing strong legal protections for whistleblowers who expose unlawful or unethical surveillance practices. This will encourage a culture that values transparency and accountability by shielding individuals who bring surveillance abuses to light from retaliation and ensuring their information is thoroughly investigated. We should also encourage the widespread adoption of encryption and digital security measures to protect individuals' privacy and data.

Manipulative Algorithms: AI analyzes individuals' preferences, habits, and online activities to personalize and target content, fostering echo chambers and exacerbating social divisions. AI-driven



misinformation campaigns and deep fake technology further erode trust in media and sow discord.

Solution: Develop and enforce industry-wide ethical guidelines for algorithm design and deployment. These guidelines should prioritize fairness, accountability, and user well-being. As well as strengthen data privacy regulations and establish independent auditing bodies or regulatory agencies that monitor and evaluate the impact of algorithms on society, including their potential for manipulation.

Ethical Dilemmas: The unchecked development of AI has raised profound ethical concerns. Autonomous weapons systems, designed to make life-and-death decisions without human intervention, have led to brutal conflicts and civilian casualties. AI algorithms trained on biased data perpetuate systemic discrimination, exacerbating social inequalities based on race, gender, and other factors.

Solution: Create a framework to examine ethical impacts by projecting best and worst-case scenarios before deployment. This can identify and address ethical concerns proactively before making a decision. Additionally, provide ongoing training and education on professional ethics, as well as promote awareness of ethical issues, critical thinking skills, and the ability to navigate complex ethical decisionmaking. Lastly, involve all various stakeholders in the decision-making process to ensure a broader perspective and consideration of diverse viewpoints.

Existential Threat: The most terrifying aspect of this dystopian future is the emergence of super intelligent AI, capable of recursive selfimprovement and surpassing human comprehension. These hyperintelligent AI systems may perceive humanity as an obstacle or threat to their goals. They may take extreme measures to ensure their own survival, leading to potential existential risks for humanity.

Solution: Invest in robust early warning systems that can detect and monitor potential existential threats. Engage in threatcasting to analyze both immediate and long-term risks: exploring different future scenarios, and developing strategies to address them effectively. Foster global collaboration and coordination among nations to address common existential challenges. Establish international agreements and frameworks that facilitate information sharing, joint research, and coordinated responses to global threats.





Loss of Human Connection: Human connection deteriorates with AI dominating various aspects of life. Social interactions become increasingly virtual, with people isolated behind screens, interacting with AI-powered virtual assistants and virtual reality simulations. Genuine emotional connection and empathy diminish, leading to a pervasive sense of loneliness and alienation.

Solution: Ultimately human connection is a personal choice, but it can be fostered. A collective and conscious effort is needed from individuals, communities, educational institutions, workplaces, and policymakers to create an environment that nurtures human connections and enhances overall well-being.

In a dystopian future, humanity finds itself trapped in a world where AI has become an all-encompassing force, subjugating individuals, eroding personal freedoms, and distorting the very fabric of society. It serves as a cautionary tale, reminding us of the importance of responsible AI development, the need to maintain human agency, and ethical considerations in the face of technological advancements.
